AFCP AGM

AFCP FORUMS- Autumn 2020

Charities funding two of our joint studentships with AHDB, along with other interested members, had the opportunity to participate in Regional Forums this autumn, which were held via video conferencing.

At the **Eastern Region Forum**, George Crane (NIAB/Cambridge University) gave a presentation on his soil health work and at the **South West Regional Forum** Bobby Hyde (Nottingham University) spoke on calf health.

In addition, participants at the SW Forum heard Dr Luke O'Grady (Nottingham University) introduce our new studentship **'Evaluating strategies to reduce net carbon emissions from dairy production systems'.**

Our fourth student, Claire Hoarau, who is working on cabbage stem flea beetle, will be speaking at the oilseed rape forum in June. She has recently presented a poster on part of her project at Harper Adams University, which can be viewed on the AFCP website <u>CSFB poster</u>.

FORUMS 2021

Looking to the future, we plan to hold a series of Forums in 2021on a range of topics aimed at different audiences. Apart from the first one, we very much hope that we will be able to physically meet for these!

The first, on February 23rd, is entitled **AFCP Charity Control Coordination** and Governance.

It will provide an opportunity for charity trustees and secretaries/ administrators to discuss issues which are common to us all. The forum is being organised by Gordon Bennett, AFCP Board Member and Perry Foundation Secretary. Management of Oilseed Rape Diseases and Pests, was originally planned for April 2020, but postponed due to COVID-19, and is now being moved to 16th June 2021 in the hope that it can be held at the University of Hertfordshire, hosted by Professor Bruce Fitt. The popular AFCP **Student Forum** is held biennially and in 2021 will be hosted by Cranfield University in early July (date to be confirmed). All students funded by AFCP charities are welcome to attend and to present their work.

Further details will be sent to charities and students early in the New Year. Please encourage your students to attend and consider supporting them by helping with their expenses (travel and, if necessary, over-night accommodation).

Charity trustees and university supervisors are also welcome to attend. In the

past, students have told us that they have greatly benefited from these meetings.

The National Forum in 2021 will be held at Hartpury University and Hartpury College, Gloucester, in November. Planning is still at an early stage but the programme will include visiting the new Agri-Tech Centre (see <u>Hartpury Agri-Tech</u>) and hearing about the work there.

Regional Forums, principally to hear about the work of our AFCP/AHDB students, will be arranged for the summer/autumn of 2021. More details later.

OTHER NEWS

(1) Digitising the Brighton Crop Protection Conferences Five AFCP charities have donated a total of £7.5K towards this project, for which the BCPC is very grateful and report that the digitisation process is well underway with all past proceedings despatched for processing. The first searchable PDF files are due back shortly and will be used to start loading and testing the front end functionality. With the Christmas break looming, it is most likely that it will be early 2021 before a significant library of past proceedings is available; we will keep you posted of further progress.

(2) East of England Agricultural Society Talks

Earlier this year the EEAS held a series of evening Zoom talks leading up to their Farming Conference in November. Subjects included: soil and weather, environmental land management, diversification, climate-friendly farming, and cover cropping.
